Apiary developments and projects for 2012

- 1. The bee shelter; The Copeland Fund has provided an additional grant to WDBKA to put up a bee shelter to cover the hives. This will enable apiary meetings to be more independent of wet weather. The aim is for a group of volunteers to build the shelter early in the New Year, while the bees are still quiet. A date for this will be confirmed in early January.
- 2. Apiary visits; The aim is to run regular Saturday meetings. There will be a 4 weekly programme, with one meeting for Beginners, one for more experienced beekeepers, one for those interested in Queen rearing and one for visits to members' apiaries each month. A programme will be circulated to members in the spring.
- 3. Queen rearing made simple; With the poor summer weather, a shortage of queens has been a significant problem in 2011. To address this, Dominic will run a local queenrearing course this year, using Apidea & Keiler nucs and local queens. This course is aimed at all beekeepers, including beginners.
- 4. New website; Richard Robinson has been busy designing a website for W&DBKA called www.whitehavenbeekeepers.co.uk. The ID for the members' area is member, and the password is WDBKA. Alan Robson noticed a plant in his daughter's garden, which was flowering in September & covered with bees. Some research suggests this is *Actaea simplex* 'Brunette', is a clump-forming perennial which has dark, brownish purple foliage, purple stems and spikes of purple-tinted, off-white flowers. It is happy growing in moist soil in partial shade, which is good news for Cumbrian gardeners & beekeepers. Is anyone growing Actaea already?
